What Does It Mean That We Are Living in The End Times?



We're in the thick of the "holiday season." The commercials and holiday specials on TV attempt to dictate what life should be like this time of year. We often see families smiling and laughing. But how often do our lives really look and feel anything like those overly produced moments we see in movies and on TV? Is our holiday experience filled with laughter and delight, or is it mostly filled with stress and anxiety? The chaos of this life and the whirlwind of increasingly busy schedules can leave us with a sense of longing rather than fulfillment.

The pain and hardship of this life, whether at this time of year or anytime, should come as no surprise. We are living in the *End Times*, the last days before the end of the world comes. But so what? What difference does that make? God makes it clear that we shouldn't be surprised when life isn't the Hollywood ideal. In fact, because of sin in this world, God says that this life is going to be troublesome. He even warns us that wickedness will increase in the last days.

Jesus' work for us, his death and his resurrection, assure us of his love. While there may be dark times in this life, none of those change God's love. He is with us now to help us get through the rough times. Because of Jesus and the gift of salvation that he won for us, finally God will take us to be with him forever in heaven. These *End Times* will give way to an eternity of true joy! Whatever you're experiencing, He remains IMMANUEL—God with us!



- Christmas Day Dec. 25 "The Word Became Flesh"—Jn 1:1–14


You are always welcome to any of our Bible classes!



DECEMBER 2024

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us"). When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. (Matthew 1:18-24)

Have you ever been scared? As a child, crossing the street without assistance, a car ran me over, breaking my right leg in two places. For two weeks I was hospitalized with my whole right leg, part of my left leg and my abdomen in casts. I went back home, but it wasn't easy for me not being able to move for a couple of weeks. Once they took the cast off, I was so scared. I thought, I was going to fall. Finally, one day I started walking, and my fears disappeared.

A story says that one man was walking and saw a huge bull blocking the way. Dead with fear, he prayed asking for the bull to leave, but he did not. A voice said to him: "Do what you need to do, but keep going". He filled his heart with bravery and decided to grab the bull by the horns, no matter what. Courageously, he confronted the bull.

You won't believe what happened. The bull spoke to him: "Why did you take so long to come to me? Were you scared? I've been waiting for you so that I might take you with me. Hop on my back, and tell me where you wish to go".

Joseph, too, was in a dilemma; He didn't know what do with the pregnant Mary. In dreams he heard these words: "Joseph, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife..." What seemed like a problem turned out to be a blessing. Courage to find the blessing, and overcome the fear is what we need.

The Lord gives words of security to all who belong to Him: "Do not be afraid". These words were heard by Abraham, David, Zechariah, Peter, Mary Magdalene, Mary and Joseph and many others.

Today, God says to us: "Do not be afraid", even though we have many reasons to be scared, such as flying on a plane, facing terrorism, losing a job, facing illness or even death.

Though fear is natural, and we have to deal with it, let us not forget that God has control of all, including our fears. Christmas is near; where we always remember that everything has a significant meaning. Celebrate Christmas! Celebrate Immanuel! Celebrate God with us! Celebrate that He brings to us His peace and salvation!

Eventually, in the 17th century, Las Posadas began to include a procession. It appears that this change came out of resistance from the people to celebrate in the atriums of the church, preferring instead the indigenous custom of celebrating in the homes of individuals.

As the celebration of Las Posadas became more commonly celebrated in homes rather than in the church, the celebration quickly became part of family tradition, and other elements were added. As the processions visited homes throughout the community, it became customary to offer refreshments to the guests. Dances and parties took place, and candy and piñatas became staples of the festivities for the young. The tradition that continues to be passed down from generation to generation is a combination of religious elements along with a type of festival celebration that includes several typical elements as described throughout this resource. Las Posadas can be hosted by individual families, churches, neighborhoods, and entire towns.

Truly, Las Posadas is a traditional Hispanic celebration depicting Mary and Joseph's search for lodging in Bethlehem. It is most commonly celebrated in Mexico although it is practiced in other countries as well. While originally a Roman Catholic celebration, this tradition is now also widely practiced as a one day event among other denominations and in secular venues. The word posada means "inn" or "place of lodging," literally a place where one can posar (rest). In this celebration, figures representing Mary and Joseph take part in a procession that goes from door to door guided by the angel seeking posada, or lodging. The traditional song of Las Posadas is a series of responsive verses sung between a group of pilgrims asking for lodging and innkeepers turning them away. Finally, after several stops, the innkeepers realize who is asking for lodging and welcome them in with open arms. All those in the procession enter the "inn" and a celebration, often including refreshments and a piñata, follows.

Las Posadas, in addition to being a reenactment of Mary and Joseph looking for lodging in the inn, has a variety of applications and lessons for the Christian life. While the practice of this tradition has become very secularized, it remains a wonderful tool for use in the church. It is one way of preparing for Jesus our Savior's coming and is a reminder that this should be awaited with great joy. When the time for Jesus' birth drew near, Mary and Joseph were unable to find lodging.

Likewise, the world into which Jesus entered did not recognize Him as the Messiah. Even today the world often does not recognize Jesus, who would have all people know Him as Lord and Savior of their lives. Las Posadas provides an excellent opportunity to reinforce the Gospel message of Jesus, born as a baby, come to Earth as our Redeemer. Las Posadas also provides opportunity to explore the themes of welcoming the stranger and serving your neighbor in need. In addition to serving as a celebration for the faithful Christian, Las Posadas can be an excellent tool for Christian outreach into the community. The pilgrimage and the accompanying party provide opportunities for churches and individuals to invite their community and neighbors in and share a time of celebration and joy. Las Posadas provides churches and individuals an amazing opportunity to connect with Hispanics in their communities in a culturally relevant, non-threatening way.

Hosting Las Posadas provides an opportunity to teach the Gospel message of Jesus' birth as our Savior, connect with those in the community, and enjoy a time of celebration with family, friends, and neighbors. If you ever get the chance to participate, don't pass it up.
